Summary

Main Entry: Baptist Student Union Collection

Date Span: 1926 – 1993

Abstract: A collegiate program of the Southern Baptist Convention that served as a liaison between colleges and local churches. Provided avenues for community service projects and missions activities. An artificial collection combined from several Baptist history files.

Size: One linear ft.

Biographical Sketch

Though the Baptist Student Union (a Baptist collegiate organization now called Baptist Collegiate Ministries) has roots dating back to 1905 at Baylor University in Waco, Texas, it officially became a mission of the Baptist Sunday School Board (now LifeWay Christian Resources) in 1921. Frank Hartwell Leavell was the first at the Board to oversee the national program and defined the BSU as “the connecting link between the college and the local church.”¹ Baptist Student Unions encouraged students to become involved in a local church while they were away at college, and local churches in and around universities frequently provided services to college BSUs. Baptist Student Union programs were present at both Baptist and non-Baptist colleges and universities, and they usually offered weekly Bible studies and provided various opportunities for volunteer community service. Additionally, students were given the opportunity to volunteer for mission activities, which were offered during spring and fall breaks and over the summer.

The Baptist Student Union program grew considerably throughout the twentieth century. By the end of the 1920s, the program had developed a more structured nature across the United States, with its most heavy involvement in the South. States began holding statewide and regional BSU retreats, and the Southern Baptist Convention sponsored its first annual Baptist Student Union conference in 1926. Increases in college enrollment after the Second World War prompted the Sunday School Board to make closer examination of the BSU in the 1960s. In 1962, the Board restated the BSU objectives, and, in 1968, the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention commenced a two-year study on the nation’s Baptist Student Unions. It concluded that oversight of the organizations would remain with the BSSB and that additional financial

support was necessary for BSUs to continue meeting their objectives. In 1980, 1,138 campuses across the United States had BSU programs.²

Scope and Content Note

The Baptist Student Union Collection is an artificial collection compiled from several Baptist history files and consists of one and a half linear feet of material (thirty-three folders contained in three document boxes). The collection documents activities of the Baptist Student Union across the United States from 1926 – 1993, with the bulk of materials in the collection dating from the 1930s and 1940s. The Baptist Student Union Collection contains several announcements and programs from banquets and other BSU functions, Baptist Student Union conferences at the Ridgecrest Baptist Conference in North Carolina, and historical materials on the national BSU during the twentieth century.

Many of the materials in the banquet and program files of the collection were donated to the Southern Baptist Historical Library and Archives by Davis Collier Woolley, director of the SBC Historical Commission from 1959 to 1971, and who served as the Student Director at Auburn University in Alabama from 1935 to 1940. Additional BSU materials are located in the Frank Hartwell Leavell Collection (AR 181) and the Donald Bradford Harbuck Papers (AR 633) of the SBHLA. The Leavell Collection contains material on the BSU in its infancy, as Leavell served as the first head of student department at the Baptist Sunday School Board. The Harbuck Collection consists of much later materials (mainly from Arkansas) from the 1970s and 1980s. The Executive Committee Records (AR 627) contain minutes and evaluations of the 1986 BSU Study Committee.
